Michael was fondly remembered by his family, who described him as a devoted son and brother with a strong religious faith. Michael spent his career in banking, moving upwards until he was the bank manager of a branch in Beaconsfield.

Michael was a keen traveller, enjoying travelling across the UK and abroad, including several cruises on the QE2. Michael also enjoyed trips to the theatre, with the musical 'Islands in the Stream' being a firm favourite, and was a keen card player.

Michael chose to leave a part of his estate to BucksVision when he passed away last year, leaving a five-figure sum to the charity. As with many of the donations that we receive, this was completely unexpected and came out of the blue.

Living Well with Sight Loss

Jan Foster from the RNIB, in partnership with BucksVision, recently hosted an excellent two day 'Living Well with Sight Loss' course, at John Lewis in Milton Keynes.

It was wonderful to have a face-to-face meeting again. Our 22 attendees were able to chat, make new friends, and trade helpful tips.

Topics discussed included the hospital based ECLO service; benefits and registration; Guide Dogs; daily living and mobility; SARC (BISS is the Bucks equivalent) who provide help and support for people with sight and hearing loss in MK; technology; travel concessions; Charles Bonnet Syndrome, whereby people with sight loss can experience visual hallucinations; wellbeing and taking those first small steps to help build confidence; local support and activity groups; setting goals; and all the help RNIB and BucksVision can provide.

Vocal Eyes Descriptive Guided Touch Tour Friday 21 July at 11.30am

An informal tour for blind and visually impaired people aged 12+. It includes a tea break where you can glide through the history and ritual of tea, with a transportive audio and live dance performance.

Gratte Ciel: Place des Anges. Touch Tour & Audio Description Saturday 29 July

Touch Tour - 8.45pm Performance - 9.45pm

A beautiful, astonishing and breath-taking spectacle to enchant audiences of all ages. As night falls across the city, angels begin to appear, high up in the sky. They move through the air, magically suspended above the crowd below. The angels start to glide down into the audience, releasing white feathers which float across the sky. Each angel has their own unique character and style and as their aerial antics become more boisterous, the clouds of feathers thicken, creating a sense of awe and wonder.

My Journey of Discovery By Mike Pearson

Audio books can be transformational. Book clubs offer opportunities for bringing people together and open up new topics and authors to explore. In these modern times of social media and fake news, it's sometimes a comfort to be grounded in "non-fiction". Audio books take you on a journey of discovery; to a world and place away from everyday life.

Borrow an audio book from your local library, subscribe to a monthly selection of titles, such as Audible, or join the free RNIB and Calibre library service. Either way, it's a journey!

I borrowed an audio book from the local library which chronicled Ernest Shackleton's epic journey to the Antarctic. 'Endurance – Shackleton's Incredible Journey' by Alfred Lansing, narrated by Simon Prebble. It was compelling listening.

Sir Ernest Shackleton participated in four expeditions during the 'Heroic Age' of Antarctic exploration, leading three of them. He was an impressive leader, known for his bravery and ability to build camaraderie in his crews.

In December 1914 Shackleton set sail for the Antarctic aboard the Endurance, by October 1915 his ship had been crushed. The 28 men crew endured five months camped on a drifting ice floe before reaching the uninhabited Elephant Island. From there Shackleton took four men and headed for South Georgia, 800 miles away. It was more than three months before Shackleton was able to rescue the men left on Elephant Island.

In 2019 another group of explorers went looking for the wreck of the Endurance and that's a story I can't wait to read – I've already requested to borrow the audio book from my local Library!
