Talking Televisions

For some years there have been fully accessible talking televisions available from large manufacturers like Panasonic, Sony, Samsung and LG, but this feature normally meant you had to purchase one of their more expensive models.

However **LG** have now made this feature available on their lower priced models. They have a built-in feature called “Audio Guidance” and when it is turned on everything is spoken to you.

This includes telling you which station you have tuned into; the volume level; navigating the TV guide (including program titles and descriptions); and navigating the settings menus (including retuning your TV).

LG have 3 models: a 24 inch for £169, a 28 inch for £189 and a 32 inch, with a higher specification, for £199.

Other manufacturers:

Samsung with Voice Guide

Voice Guide is available on all series 7, 8 and 9 models and most series 6 models. All functions of the TV should speak, including speech support on some third-party apps including Netflix and YouTube.

Sony Android Televisions

Sony Televisions based on Android TV have a screen reader option which will read out almost all screens and menus including the Sony Electronic Programme Guide.

Panasonic with Voice Guidance

These TVs can announce on-screen information and the most important menus, but the Electronic Program Guide currently doesn't have voice capability.

Echo Connect

This device plugs into your phone socket and then connects wirelessly to the Amazon range of smart speakers allowing you to both make and receive calls just by talking to your Amazon speaker.

So long as you are within range of the speaker you can just say “answer call” or “Alexa call” followed by either a number or a person’s name if they are in your contacts.

It costs £29.99 from Amazon.

Verbalise Radio Controlled Talking Recordable Reminder Clock

This is new on the market and is made by the **Talking Watch Shop**. It is a disc shaped radio - controlled talking clock with the option to record up to ten reminders.

It speaks the time, day, and date in a choice of male or female voices and can set itself to the correct time using radio

transmission. All settings are verbally announced including the ten individual reminders.

You can record a different announcement for each reminder that you have setup. For example it could be setup to tell someone to take their blood pressure tablets at 9am, take their statin at 10pm and so on, or the reminders could be recorded by different people to remind themselves of their individual requirements.

The Scruffy the Uffy Journey

Scruffy the Uffy are a range of self-published braille books produced locally in Milton Keynes. Julie-Ann Ward was inspired to write the books to help her son Dexter. Here is her story.

“Over four years ago my best friend gave Dexter a doll she called Scruffy the Uffy. Scruffy became one of Dexter’s favourite toys. When he was three months old, we learnt he had Congenital Glaucoma. This is when he had his very first surgery. At 18 months, Dexter started wearing glasses. He hated them so Daddy made a pair for Scruffy which successfully encouraged him to wear them!

At two, Dexter had his 14th surgery and lost all vision in his right eye. He was registered as severally sight impaired and shortly after this he started to use a long cane. So Daddy made Scruffy a long cane.

Dexter met his first visually impaired friend who was also a cane user just before his third birthday. Dexter then decided Scruffy needed a friend. So we bought Pink. Scramble followed Pink then Jeff then many more. Dexter’s Uffy collection now stands at fourteen.

Scruffy and Dexter have had many adventures together over the last couple of years. Not only has Scruffy been a crutch to help Dexter understand the world around him and how to use the tools he has been given to help him navigate his way in the world; he has also been a comfort to Dexter and has been on many trips with him.

Once we were told Dexter would be a braille user, we started to look for books and games for him. We very quickly realised that the provisions for children were limited. We therefore decided to create our own books using Scruffy as the star.



Dexter is now four and we have just self-published our fifth book."

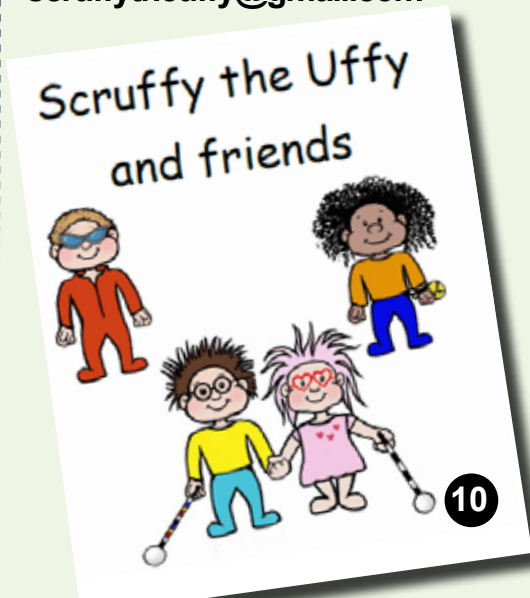
Scruffy the Uffy books have giant print, braille and tactile printing in them, and have the characters of Scruffy and friends. The book titles are:

**Scruffy and Friends learn letters
Scruffy & Pink learn numbers
Scruffy learns numbers
Scruffy the Uffy and friends - an introduction
Scruffy the Uffy helps Santa**

All books are £10 (including P&P) except Scruffy helps Santa which is £15.

They also have a number of Scruffy the Uffy dolls for £9. They can be purchased with or without canes.

Add-Venture in Learning organise residential study breaks for sight impaired adults who enjoy learning and socialising with like-minded people.

A registered charity, they are run by a volunteer committee of both sighted and sight impaired people.

The breaks are held in different parts of the country on a variety of topics which might include music, literature, history or ecology.

Accommodation varies from hotels to student accommodation. A sighted guide accompanies each sight impaired person on talks and visits to places of interest. Guide dogs are welcome.

Participants must make their own way to the venue, but these are usually not far from a railway station. The cost of each break varies according to the type of accommodation and content.

In 2012/3 he used his paintings to create cards and prints to sell with all of the proceeds coming to BucksVision.

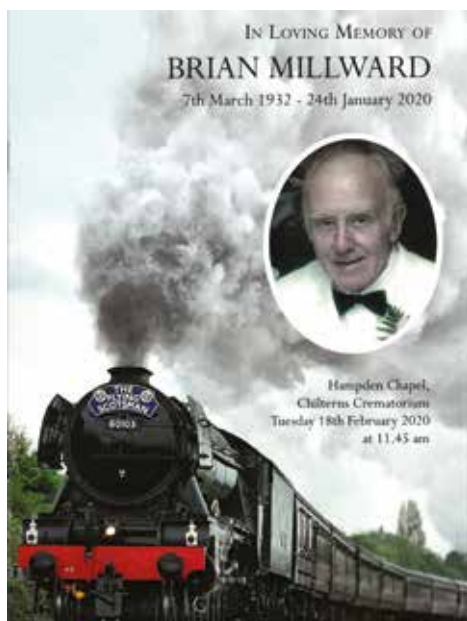
Through his fantastic work Rodney raised over £3,000 for BucksVision and his local club; a wonderful and much appreciated achievement. He will be very sadly missed.

The Safe Place Scheme

The Safe Place Scheme has been in place since 2012 and has built a network of suitable venues, such as local shops and businesses, where someone can go for help and assistance across Buckinghamshire.

What is the Safe Place Scheme?

The aim of the scheme is to provide reassurance to vulnerable people and their carers, or people who find themselves in challenging situations, so that they can live more independent lifestyles with help available when they are out and about in the community.

How does the scheme work?

Businesses who are part of the scheme will display a safe place sticker. A list of businesses can also be found on Bucks County Council's website. This means that a vulnerable person can go in and ask for help.

A vulnerable person may carry a Safe Place contact card that they

can show to a business; however you do not have to have a card to seek assistance from those businesses supporting the scheme.

What will businesses be expected to do?

If a vulnerable person seeks help, members of staff would be expected to make a phone call if necessary, provide a temporary safe haven for vulnerable people and also to reassure them and keep them safe until help and support arrives.



BCC Awareness Course



On Wednesday 26 February BucksVision and Buckinghamshire Integrated Sensory Service delivered Visual Awareness training to Buckinghamshire County Council staff from the Highways Development Team.

The morning session covered what sight loss means, ways people navigate with sight loss and demonstrating the correct way to sighted guide someone. In the afternoon the participants were paired up, and wearing either blindfolds or sim specs,

were given a route to follow. The route picked out various landmarks which cause problems for people with sight loss when out and about such as the tapering steps in Market Square, Aylesbury, pavement advertising boards and uneven paving.

The training ended with the chance for the participants to feedback their experiences and ask questions.

Hopefully the session will help the staff to ensure new developments are as accessible as possible.
